The 26th Annual Secretariat of the Pacific Regional Environment Programme (SPREP) Meeting marked an important juncture for the Pacific Islands Roundtable for Nature Conservation (PIRT) as Conservation International (CI) was officially welcomed as the Eighth Member of the Roundtable upon signing the PIRT Membership Agreement. The signing of the Agreement was an integral part of the side event. The PIRT Membership Agreement was signed by Mrs. Leilani Duffy losefa on behalf of CI which was witnessed by Mr. Stuart Chape, representative of the PIRT Secretariat. The Pacific Islands Roundtable for Nature Conservation (PIRT) is a coalition of nature conservation and development organisations, governments, inter-governmental organisations, donor agencies and community groups created to increase effective conservation actions in the Pacific Island Region. Formed in 1997 at the request of Pacific Island Countries and Territories (PICTs), the forum enables organisations working on nature conservation in the Pacific to improve their collaboration and coordination towards effective conservation action and stands as the key coordination mechanism for the implementation of the Framework for Nature Conservation and Protected Areas in the Pacific Island Region 2014-2020 (FNCPA) which was adopted at the 9th Pacific Islands Conference on Nature Conservation and Protected Areas and was subsequently endorsed at the 25th Annual SPREP Meeting 2014.

PIRT Side Event an Initiative of the Protected Areas Working Group (PAWG)

The Pacific Islands Roundtable for Nature Conservation (PIRT) Side Event titled "Size Matters! Lessons learnt in going to scale in Pacific Marine Protected Areas (MPAs)", was an initiative of the Protected Areas Working Group (PAWG) of the Roundtable coorganised by both the PIRT Secretariat, Secretariat of the Pacific Regional Environment Programme (SPREP) and Conservation International (CI). Held at the Tanoa Tusitala Hotel on the 23rd of September at the 26th Annual SPREP Meeting, the lunch hour event had an overwhelming response.



There were three reputed and distinguished presenters at the event namely Ms. Anne Claire Goarant of Regional Cooperation and External Affairs, New Caledonia, Mr. Schannel van Dijken, the Senior Marine Manager of the CI, Samoa and Mr. Joseph Brider, the Director of National Environment Service, Cook Islands. Interesting discussions on the marine protected areas and extra large marine reserves were carried out on what was most suitable and applicable for the Pacific region.


Pacific Invasives Partnership (PIP) in Focus

The Pacific Invasives Partnership (PIP) is the largest and most active Working Group of the Roundtable. PIP is the umbrella regional coordinating body for agencies working on invasive species in more than one country of the Pacific.

The goal of PIP is to assist Pacific island countries and territories in achieving more effective invasive species management which PIP and its member organisations carry out by building local capacity and helping to tackle Pacific invasives problems. This includes coordinated planning and assistance from regional and international agencies to meet the invasive species management needs of the countries and territories in the Pacific. The Guidelines for Invasive Species Management in the Pacific provide the framework for action by all of the PIP member agencies and has been endorsed by 26 Pacific countries and territories.

Amongst their many success stories, PIP recent report which was launched through a side event at the 2014 Pacific Island Leaders Forum, On the Verge of a Biological Crisis: The state of invasive species in the Pacific" highlighted the serious issue of invasive species and some solutions specifically for the Pacific.

The Protected Areas Working Group (PAWG) was reconvened on the 4th of March 2015, in response to the need to provide a forum to better connect a diverse range of people and their work relating to protected and conserved areas,. The PAWG is another Working Group of the Pacific Islands Roundtable for Nature Conservation with an extensive partnership within the region and internationally. To increase efficacy with respect to gaining momentum with communications and conservation work, the Pacific Islands Protected Area Portal (PIPAP) was launched at the World Parks Congress in Sydney, 2014 through PAWG.
