Pacific SIDS Post-COP26 Analysis Meeting

CONTEXT

Pacific SIDS Post-COP26 Analysis
Virtual meeting hosted by SPREP
Pacific Climate Change Centre, Apia, Samoa
15 – 17 February 2022

The UNFCCC COP26 which was held from the 1-13 November 2021 concluded with the adoption of the Glasgow Climate Pact. Reactions to the COP26 outcome have been mixed. While the result could have been more ambitious, the outcome of COP26 represents a critical milestone for the Paris Agreement. These included:

- The Glasgow Climate Pact recognises the importance of multilateralism and the critical importance of science as the basis for accelerated climate action to keep 1.5C within reach.
- The Paris Agreement Rulebook was finalised in Glasgow including guidance, rules and modalities for the operationalisation of Article 6.
- Establishment of a two-year work programme on the Global Goal on Adaptation.
- Establishment of ocean-based climate action dialogue.
- Doubling of adaptation finance by developed countries.

Concerns and questions remain on major longstanding issues for developing countries in particular on loss and damage and scaling up climate finance. While there were disagreements on the acknowledgement of fossil fuels in the text and the push by some countries to phase down and instead of phase out fossil fuels, others see this as a first step in the right direction.

Many of the adopted decisions proposed technical work that will be taken forward in 2022. The negotiations will continue as the world turns toward COP27 in Sharm El Sheikh, Egypt in November 2022.

PSIDS engagement at COP26 was critical for ensuring Pacific voices and priorities were heard and adequately addressed in the Glasgow outcomes. The Post COP26 analysis workshop will take stock of the outcomes and shortcomings of COP26, what worked well in terms of the Pacific engagement and identify areas for improvement. In addition, the workshop will look into the Pacific priorities for 2022 in the lead up to the June session and COP27 in Egypt.

MEETING OBJECTIVES AND EXPECTED OUTCOMES

The meeting will:

- 1. Provide a Post COP26 briefing which will also address state of play of the UNFCCC negotiations and key issues related thereto;
- 2. Provide updated information on the key related UNFCCC Meetings for 2022 and COP27;











3. Initial planning for PSIDS activities in the lead up to the Subsidiary Bodies sessions (June 2022) and COP27 (November 2022).
